Dear Saints,

This week and next our meditation will remain in St. Matthew’s Gospel as we journey through toward the end of this mini-season of four weeks fixed on the *parousia* of the Lord, culminating in the Sunday of the Fulfillment — the last Sunday of the church year, when Christ is depicted as “all in all” on the Last Day.

In the parable of the talents, Jesus makes a connection with the preceding parable of the Ten Bridesmaids (or Virgins) by using similar terminology. They’re making a similar point. A man going on a trip summoned his three servants and gives them five talents, two, and one, respectively. The first two traded wisely and doubled their allotments. The last servant dug a hole in the ground and hid what he had been given.

When the man returned, the first two are rewarded. The third is condemned and even what he had was taken from him. Perhaps no parable has been more misused than Jesus’ parable of the talents. The point is missed — it’s not about a timeless truth concerning finances. It’s about judgment on the remaining two tribes of Israel and, so, what Israel had will be taken from them and given to others. In other words, the Lord will reconstitute Israel not around the scribes and Pharisees (the wicked, unprofitable servant), but around the fulfillment of Moses and the Prophets. And the Lord will do this through the Messiah to whom both the Law and Prophets bear witness.

This challenging text, like last week, calls us to see that God has always planned to rescue the world through Israel and that all of Israel’s history, hopes, and destiny have come to bear on His Messiah ... not on our particular management of “talents.” This should come as good news. The talent now in our hands, committed to our care, is the Holy Gospel. We dare not bury it by failing to assemble. So let us rejoice and do so singing and proclaiming the great works of God in Christ.

This past week the Church Calendar hallmarked the commemoration of St. Justinian the Great (14 Nov.), St. Martin’s death (11 Nov.) and the birth of Martin Luther (10 Nov.), and the birth of Bishop and Confessor, Martin Chemnitz (9 Nov.). These saints and confessors are part of our family and remembered before God in our prayer of the church, as they abide in His presence.
